It's after careful thought that I elect Him in my absence to perform as Duke. Lend him my power, all of my support, And deputize him every single organ Of my position. What do you think?

**ANGELO** 

The heavens give safety to your purposes!

**ESCALUS** 

Lead forth and bring you back in happiness!

**DUKE** 

I thank you. Fare you well.

Exit.

**ESCALUS** 

I shall desire you, sir, to give me leave
To have free speech with you; and it concerns me
To look into the bottom of my place.
A pow'r I have, but of what strength and nature
I am not yet instructed.

**ANGELO** 

'Tis so with me. Let us withdraw together, And we may soon our satisfaction have Touching that point.

**ESCALUS** 

I'll wait upon your honor.

Exeunt.
